PRINCIPAL'S REPORT Parent Workshops

Last month Mr Tilley and Miss Neubronner ran a very well attended workshop for parents about the school's BYOD program. On Monday 27th March we will be holding our second parent workshop from 5.30pm–6.30pm in the boardroom in the administration building. This workshop will look at the new HSC reforms, and in particular new minimum standards for literacy and numeracy. These changes will apply to our current Year 9 students. This year's NAPLAN will give students their first opportunity to demonstrate they can achieve the minimum standard in numeracy and literacy. Homework Centre and Year 12 Study Sessions

All students are welcome to attend the Homework Centre, held every Tuesday afternoon from 2.40pm - 3.40pm in the Teaching and Learning Centre. Mrs Doyle will be available to help students. This is an excellent opportunity to catch up on classwork or get help with assessment tasks.



Improving the Learning Environment During the holiday period we will be working on several areas to improve the school environment. The second phase of our oval upgrade will commence. This will involve removing some of the existing trees, which have been tagged as high risk, levelling and laying turf for a new playing field, extending the irrigation system, building sandstone retaining walls to provide additional seating for students and the development of a new recreational area with new plants, shaded areas and seating.

Leading up to the holidays new lockers are currently being installed. Students will be able to hire the lockers shortly. This initiative has been financially supported by the P&C to ensure students have a secure location to store their laptop during the day when it is not in use. Further information to come.

New shade areas will be installed in the playground providing additional shaded areas outside the Teaching and Learning Centre and the drama amphitheatre.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

ADVICE FOR PARENTS OF YEAR 9 STUDENTS 2017

March 2017

In 2020, your child will need to meet a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to qualify for a Higher School Certificate (HSC).

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PRACTICAL LITERACY AND NUMERACY SKILLS



The minimum standard will ensure that your child is ready for further education and training, employment and life after school.

The standard is set at Level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF), a nationally agreed standard of functional literacy and numeracy.

It means students can do things like:

Find the time and date of a music concert on an online ticket website	Calculate the quantity of paint required to paint a room	Estimate distance, travel time and costs for a transport route
Take notes from a lecture or training session	Create a personal weekly budget in a spreadsheet	Write a job application letter
Measure quantities to follow a recipe	Follow safety instructions in an equipment manual	Enter data in a computer-based management system

MULTIPLE OPPORTUNITIES TO MEET THE STANDARD

Your child will show that they have met the standard by passing new online reading, writing and numeracy tests.

They will take the online tests at school. Your child can take the tests up to twice a year in:

Year 10

Year 11

Year 12

for up to five years after they start their first HSC course.

Students can take the tests from next year when they are in Year 10.

YEAR 9 NAPLAN: A CHANCE TO PREQUALIFY FOR THE STANDARD

Your child can prequalify for the standard by achieving Band 8 or above in their Year 9 NAPLAN reading, writing and numeracy tests this year. This means that they won't have to take the online tests.

It is important for you to know that not all students are expected to achieve Band 8 in their Year 9 NAPLAN tests this year.

Your child will not be stopped from getting the HSC on the basis of their Year 9 NAPLAN results.

Your child's literacy and numeracy skills will continue to develop and it is expected that they will meet the standard either by the end of Year 10, Year 11 or Year 12.

Your child's school will provide support for them to meet the standard to get the HSC.

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DEPUTY PRINCIPALS REPORT

It has been an eventful start to the year and the end of the term is just around the corner. There have been a number of important events taking place at the school in recent weeks. We have had successful swimming and cross country carnivals and been represented in the region by a number of sporting teams including football, soccer, netball, water polo, cricket and many others. We have also won the zone swimming carnival which is a wonderful accolade for the school. Congratulations to all those competitors and parents, and a thank you to staff for organising events and coaching the teams.

Tell Them From Me – Student Survey

This week our students have been invited to participate in the "Tell them from me survey". This survey is designed to give students a voice to express opinion about the academic, structural and wellbeing programs within the school. The survey is anonymous and provides a wonderful opportunity for us as an organisation to assess our strengths and areas where we can improve.

This survey was completed during selected classes, with each student in the school being invited to participate and provide their own feedback. There will be opportunity later in the year for both parents and staff to provide similar feedback with the intention of continually assessing and improving our performance and practices across the school.

Year 12 Half Yearly Examinations

Year 12 start their half yearly examinations, which can be a stressful time. Students have been issued with an examination timetable already, and should be undertaking preparations for these assessments. Students are reminded that they will need to complete a misadventure form should they miss any examinations and include a doctor's certificate to support any absence.

There is a lot of support available for students by their teachers, head teachers and the learning support team. If there are any issues, please see the staff concerned, your year adviser or one of the deputies.

Differentiated Learning

25 of our staff have completed GERRIC training, a 16 hour course in differentiated learning which was completed after school and on the teachers own time. With the completion of this round of training, the majority of our staff have now undertaken this training with an aim to provide the highest quality individualised learning possible for our students. Thank you to those staff for their dedication and hard work.

Bandwidth Update

We have been notified this week that the requested internet bandwidth has been upgraded, and some additional strategies including modifying how internet traffic moves through the network have been implemented. This means that the network should be running much more quickly, providing improved opportunity for our students to access digital technologies and to make full use of our successful BYOD program.

In other BYOD news, we are very excited by the uptake by our students, with more than 700 of our students using their own laptop in class. This program will be further supported in the very near future with the arrival of our lockers for students to safely store their equipment including laptops.

Uniform

We are about to head into the cooler months of the year. It is a good time to check the wardrobe and ensure that winter uniform items fit and are available. Our uniform shop is open on Tuesdays and Fridays for purchase of new uniform items.

Students are reminded of a few key points regarding uniform:

- Shoes must be **all** black and made of leather. Shoes with a white sole or with substantial portions of other colours are not part of our uniform.
- White socks are to be worn with the uniform. There has been a trend amongst a few students returning to school wearing black or navy socks. These are not part of our uniform.
- Hooded tops are not to be worn at any time and students will be instructed to remove these items. Students may access a loan jumper if their school jumper is not available for use on a particular day.

Should a student be out of uniform, they may bring a note from home and collect a blue note from the deputy principal. Students are expected to collect a blue note from the deputy if they are out of uniform. We have many uniform items for loan should a need arise. Support is also accessible for those who are unable to afford uniform items. Please contact the administration office to access this support if required.

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Attendance

We are constantly aiming to maintain and improve our very high standards at Erskine Park High School. It is clear that the amount of time that students are in class directly impacts on their learning. However, there are circumstances which prevent students from attending school such as illness or doctors' appointments. Parents may inform the school of student absences by responding to SMS messages, using the parent portal or via a hand written note from home sent in the with student on the next day they attend school.

Students who are late to school should bring a note and sign in at the console in the administration office. If a note is not available, students will be provided with a slip for parents to sign and return to school. For any queries about student absence, please contact the administration office.

Road Safety

There has been some confusion regarding the road safety signs outside school. There are two types of road safety signs on Swallow Drive.

	These signs indicate a speed hump and are to reduce the speed of traffic on the road.	
$\overline{}$	This is NOT a safe place to cross the road as drivers do not expect to see pedestrians here.	
	These signs are on the pedes- trian crossing and indicate the only safe place to cross the road.	

Please make note that the speed hump in front of the school gates is not a crossing. There is a potential danger if students are crossing at this point and expecting cars to stop. Please use the crossing provided adjacent to the top gates.

Parents please be aware that the area in front of the school which extends from the beginning of the bus bay to the staff car park driveway is a no stopping zone. For the safety of our students, please refrain from parking or stopping in these areas before and after school. Parents please also note that dropping off students inside the school gates is potentially dangerous due to the high level of student and pedestrian traffic. Please drop students in the designated areas outside of the school gates.

Course Outline for Term 1 2017

Year 7 Technology Mandatory - Dream Time and Recycling Animation

Year 8 Technology Mandatory - Carrying Things and Recipe Book

Year 9

Child Studies - Conception to Birth Food Technology - Food in Australia

Year 10

Child Studies - Play and the Developing Child Food Technology - Food Product Development

Hospitality - Serve Food and Beverage Food Technology - Food Manufacture CAFS - Groups in Context

Year 7 Technology classes are participating in either a Food or Textiles unit of work. The Textiles unit involves students learning how to use the sewing machine to construct an apron. Students as part of their project will design and decorate a pocket using inspiration from aboriginal art techniques. Other classes are working on an Animation presentation to promote the Reduce, Reuse & Recycle (RRR) message in the family home. As part of the research for the design project, students will undertake a series of practical activities (food production) in order to relate themselves to the RRR process.







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Year 11 Hospitality students catered for 30 seniors during Seniors Week on 8th March at Erskine Park Community Centre. Students prepared finger foods for the occasion such as sausage rolls, zucchini slice, sandwiches, mars bar slice, cherry slice, chocolate coconut balls and fruit salad cups. The catering activity was a very worthwhile experience for all students as it involved a great deal of planning including menu selection, task allocation and costing. The students developed a range of skills such as food preparation, reheating, plating and serving food to guests.

Year 12 Hospitality students are studying the unit Serve Food and Beverages to Customers. Students prepared and served a Big Breakfast. The unit covers fundamental technical skills required to prepare the outlet for the service period, interact with customers to take orders, serve and clear food and beverages and to complete end of service tasks.



Year 10 Child Studies students have been investigating how play-based learning environments can encourage children to explore, improvise, imagine, solve problems and be



challenged physically. In class students have been participating in a range of play and craft activities suitable for children of all ages and developmental stages.

Agriculture News

After having a period of intense hot weather, autumn – winter vegetables have been planted and early seedlings are looking healthy. All classes have carefully planted their seeds and now with cooler and wetter forecasts, hopefully we will have plenty to harvest early in Term 2. Over the 2016 Christmas holiday break, we had unexpected new additions to the poultry shed with a black hen with five gold chicks, another black hen with one white, one brown, one coloured and one black chick. Recently Year's 11 and 12 have been on excursions. Year 12 had a Farm Product excursion and saw a robotic dairy at the Sydney University Dairy Research Centre as well as a small milk processing business. Year 11 visited a 24 hour dairy at the Leppington Pastoral Company and saw milking in action, new born calves and touring underneath the dairy where all the milk is stored and piped.

TAS 2 REPORT Safe start to the year

Unbelievably it is Week 9 of Term 1, 2017 and courses across all years are well underway. The first thing we do in all Industrial Arts courses that use workshops, is to review safe behaviour and safe operation of machinery. We do this using safety tests for most courses and Safe Work Method Statements (some of you would know these from work) for Vocational Education courses. The faculty has recently reviewed and updated our safety tests.



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Year 7

Many in Year 7 have been enjoying the new learning environment of the workshop classroom. If your Year 7 child is not doing Industrial Arts this Semester, they will swap from Home Economics in Semester 2. We will complete two units of work with Year 7 this semester. One unit is designing an object that is then printed in plastic on our 3D printers. We have three 3D printers that will be put to good use by Year 7 next term. The other unit is about passive solar house design and model making. We will report on the work your child has completed at the end of these two units in the Semester 1 report (their first High School report). We will report on the outcomes achieved over the next two terms. I have included an example below from the house unit.

The task:

- Sketch 2 floor plans applying passive solar design for a single storey, two bedroom holiday house.
- Draw an accurate floor plan of your chosen design scaled to 1:50. Show doors, windows, internal walls, built-ins, kitchen, bathroom and laundry. Indicate North with an arrow.
- Construct a model of your chosen design scaled to 1:50.

One of the outcomes assessed using the task above:

4.3.1 Applies a broad range of contemporary and appropriate tools, materials and techniques with competence in the development of design projects



A sample of the criteria used to measure higher achievement:

Completes all sketches and drawings to a high standard. Model neatly and accurately constructed. Drawing and model demonstrate thorough understanding of passive solar design. So when your son or daughter complains that their west facing bedroom is too hot, due to the poor orientation of the house and the lack of deep eaves you'll know they have completed the house unit in Industrial Arts.

BYOD Induction Lesson

All students in Years 7, 8 and 9 undertook a BYOD induction lesson. Students were guided through the process of setting up secret questions on their student portal. This allows them to change their internet password if they forget it at school or home. It is important students are able to do this as they need this password to access their school work on G Suite (Google Apps for Education).



Students also created folders for each of their subjects to save their school work in a logical and neat order.

CAREERS REPORT

Vocational Education and Training (VET) classes have commenced at TAFE. Good attendance at these courses is essential. The courses that students attend away from our school are run on Monday and Wednesday afternoons for 4 hours and to miss one of the lessons would be like missing a week of school.

Year 10 students will undertake preparation for Work Experience during Careers classes in Term 1, and will be issued with the necessary forms. Work experience is an optional program. Year 10 students may undertake one week of work experience during Term 2. There is a second period of work experience in Term 4 after end of year exams, for up to two weeks. So, it is possible to do work experience three times during Year 10 to experience different occupations or a variety of employers.

NSW Education

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Year 11 and 12 students may also undertake work experience. All they need to do is come and see me for the forms and discuss what they want to do.

Work experience helps students with making decisions on senior subject selection, testing out their job or career choices, gain confidence and maturity by experiencing an adult work environment, learn about what employers want from employees, and making informed decisions about their employment and further education options. It is useful to start thinking now about what students will do for work experience. If students wish to undertake work experience in the building industry they will need to obtain a WH&S Induction for Construction ("White Card") before commencement.

Year 12 students have been invited to attend a tour of Sydney University in Term 2. Permission notes for this excursion have been issued. Whilst touring the University students will be provided with information on the transition from school to university, entry requirements and the ATAR, course information, scholarships, student services, accommodation options, university societies and sporting groups.

Students and parents are invited to contact me with any queries about things such as Career

choices and prospects, subject choices, VET courses, TAFE and university applications and information, School to Work, finding employment, using Job Service providers, or any other related issues.

STUDY SKILLS WORKSHOPS – ELEVATE EDUCATION

As the Year 11 students settle into senior school life, they will notice that their teacher's expectations have increased along with the workload. In order to help students to manage their study and time, Year 11 students attended two elevate workshops on the 8th February 2017. The Study Sensei workshop covered utilising the syllabus to frame study, structuring and reviewing organised notes, conceptual learning, utilising practice exam papers and standing out through independent learning. The time management seminar covered; developing routines to balance study and lifestyle, utilising study groups to leverage time and techniques for overcoming procrastination.
