DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As the days get shorter heading into winter it seems that the weeks are racing past. It seems as though the term was just getting started and with a snap it is week six. It has been a very positive term with lots of important and valuable events taking place, as well as students gaining access to improved equipment, resources and learning environments.

Parent Information Sessions

Each month the school is running information sessions for parents about a particular area of interest. These sessions are being run in line with the P&C meetings and usually run between 5.00pm and 6.30pm. This month the school invited Elevate Education to present on supporting students with studying and time management. It was a very productive session filled with valuable information for parents to support their students.

Next month on 26 June our parent information session will be about cyber safety for students and the electronic footprint they leave. It will be delivered by a Police Officer who has kindly donated their time to the school for this important message. Please keep an eye out for the emailed invitation for this session for when to RSVP. It will be a popular session due to the nature of the content and I am sure many parents will be keen to be in attendance.

Reports and Parent/Teacher Nights

This term our staff are writing half yearly reports for our students. These reports will be available on the parent/teacher nights for each year group for collection. Parents may book interviews with their child's teachers using the parent portal on the school website.

Each year group has a specific night allocated for parent/teacher night. Please see the school calendar or the school website for details of when each night is being run.

Lockers

Our lockers are currently being well used throughout the school. Our students have capitalised on the opportunity to access this valuable resource. There are still some lockers available for hire, so please contact the office to organise access to a locker if needed.

Students and parents are reminded to review the policy and application form which may be accessed on the website. It is important that students have a clear understanding of their rights

and responsibilities in this regard.

Students are encouraged to make full use of the resource to minimise the amount of equipment that they need to carry around the school, and to secure any important items.

Oval Renovations

This week has seen the opening of the new section of our oval for students to access. The renovations are part of an ongoing commitment to our students and parents to continually improve the quality of the resources and learning areas of our school. As ever, our goal is improving student learning outcomes and this renovation provides areas which will be used to improve student access to playing fields and open areas in sport, PDHPE and breaks.

This renovation has seen the placement of a garden bed along the path, a sandstone amphitheatre of sorts for students to sit in breaks or to watch sporting events at the school, and an additional 3800 square metres of turfed area previously unavailable to students. This turfed area includes a levelled playing field of 30 x 40 metres which will be used to supplement the larger oval playing surface.

It is an exciting time for the school in accessing this new resource. I have received some very positive feedback about the area and I am looking forward to students having increased areas for both PE and for their break times.





Classroom Renovations

As with our oval renovation, we have targeted continual improvements to the classrooms and learning environments. This year we have utilised our allocated scheduled maintenance from the Department of Education to upgrade and renovate the demountable classrooms. The demountable classrooms have been repainted on the outside and in several rooms the interior has also been painted. There have been some minor structural repairs in some of the demountables also, which has ensured a pleasant learning environment for our students. Our agenda to renovate the learning spaces continues with plans into the future to continually renovate and renew classrooms to maintain high quality learning environments for our students.

Winter uniform

Congratulations to the students this term for maintaining our high standards for uniform. I have been in many meetings with parents, prospective enrolments and community members where the high standards of our uniform have been noted.

We are moving into the cooler months of Term 2. It is traditionally a time where uniform can slip in the absence of the correct pants and jumpers. It is a good time for students and parents to check the wardrobe to see if the winter uniform is still the right size and in good condition.

There will always be circumstances where items of uniform may be unavailable due to weather or circumstances. We encourage students and parents to simply bring a note from home to one of the Deputy Principals, where they can collect a blue note for the period noted.

Our uniform shop is open 8.00am-4.00pm Tuesdays and on Fridays from 12.00pm till 4.00pm. They have a large range of stock on hand to cater for your needs as we start to shift to winter uniform.

I encourage all students to continue maintaining the high standards and continue to engage with the merit system of the school. Our motto of Pride in Achievement is fundamental to what we are about and I encourage all students to embody this motto in all that they do. I hope the rest of the term is productive and successful for our students and community.

ENGLISH REPORT

Welcome to Term 2, 2017. There are a lot of exciting things happening in English! We would like to welcome Miss Ingram and Miss Healy to the English faculty, and wish Miss Andrews all the best in her new role.

What are we studying in Term 2? Year 7

Year 7 have spent the term reading and analysing a novel, focusing on representation. Within this unit, they look specifically at features of a novel and language features that enhance the overall meaning of their text.

Year 8

Each class in Year 8 have been delving into the worlds of different novels. From 1950s China, to Australia, to a futuristic world, students have been considering the experiences of others in unique contexts. They will be taking a closer look at different points of view presented in novels and evaluating their impact on the ideas of the novel.

Year 9

This term, Year 9 have explored a range of texts with alternate perspectives in their unit, Adventures in Asia. This unit focuses on improving students written expression, as well as developing public speaking skills, which will lead directly to their assessment task in week 9.

Year 10

A significant amount of information and ideas that we gain today is through visual texts and means. The Visual Literacy unit will take students through a critical and analytical journey of various picture books. In this unit, Year 10 students will be gaining essential skills in interpreting and understanding ideas and messages from visual texts.

Assessment Reminders

All junior students are reminded that they will be assessed on their current unit of work prior to the end of term. They are encouraged to engage in regular revision and to continue applying themselves with diligence.

Years 11 and 12 will be receiving assessment notifications in the coming weeks. It is important that our seniors are revising and writing draft responses to submit to their English teacher to receive personalised feedback. All senior students are reminded that they will be assessed on each unit covered in their HSC English course, so

please ensure that previous content is covered during revision.

Technology and BYOD

The English faculty are continuing to embrace BYOD for Years 7-12 by utilising websites to enhance students engagement. Many English classes have a Google Classroom that enables students working on their laptops immediate access to work. This is also used as a platform for students and teachers to discuss content outside of class time. We encourage all students to bring their device to each lesson, ensuring that they are fully charged and have the necessary programs to complete their work effectively, which can be downloaded from the Student Portal.

Debating

2017 Topics

- Discuss with your parents/family to identify a family link to an Australian soldier then research that person's life. Your research should cover his/her pre-service life, service training, overseas service, post-service life and issues (good and bad). Present your research and your views about his/her involvement, in a way that best illustrates his/her commitment to Australia's part in the war effort.
- Author a poem or design a visual display that best reflects your thoughts/feelings about those in the Australian Defence Force who gave their lives so that all current and future Australians can live in the freedom, peace and harmony that we enjoy in this Nation today. The work should focus on the 1917-era of Australia's participation in the First World War – in particular, the Third Passendaele battle (October) and must include an addendum to illustrate what caused you to choose this topic and what were the ideas that your poem/display is trying to display. The poem or display may be considered for inclusion in the Remembrance Day Service at St Marys RSL Club on Saturday 11 November 2017.
- "The fall of Singapore to the Japanese Army on 15 February 1942 is considered one of the greatest defeats in the history of the British Army and probably Britain's worst defeat in World War Two. The fall of Singapore in 1942 clearly illustrated the way Japan was to fight in the Far East" How was it that 65,000 Japanese troops were able to overcome 90,000 British, Indian and Australian troops so easily? Discuss the fall of Singapore, its aftermath and the treatment of POWs by the Japanese. Include your views about situations where basic human needs and ethics were abandoned.
- On 19 February 1942 (75 years ago), Darwin was bombed for the first time. Detail the events that followed in relation to attacks on Australia's mainland in the ensuing years. Imagine yourself in Darwin through 1942 at about age 18 (while Darwin is under attack and Australia's security under direct threat) how might you think and react to that situation?
- Conduct research into the broad range of animals that have been used by Australians in any conflict since the Boer War. What uses were they put to? How effective were they?
 Detail at least two such instances. What are

- your feelings about the ethical use of animals in warfare?
- In recent years Australia has been involved in a number of conflicts including Iraq and
 Afghanistan. Choose one, then research to determine if Australia's involvement was valued by our Coalition Forces. Was our military involvement accepted and supported by Australians generally? Why do you support (or NOT support) your research outcomes.

2017 COLIN SHEPHERD OAM MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Frequently asked questions:

- What is a scholarship? A payment awarded to a student that is to be used for learning and education.
- Who can get the "Col Shepherd Scholarship"? Any 2017 Year 10 student who is going to go onto Years 11 and 12 or TAFE.
- What can I spend my scholarship money on? The scholarship money can only be spent on things that are education and school related. Past scholarship winners have used the scholarship for buying a laptop. Some students have used it for paying for a PDHPE excursion to the Jindabyne ski fields. Other school expenses (fees, uniform, textbooks and software) have been paid for with the scholarship fund.
- What do I do to apply for this scholarship?
 Attempt one of the tasks listed on the back of this page, submit it by the due date, and you are in the contest for winning the scholarship.
- Am I competing with kids from around the state? No. There are three "Col Shepherd" scholarships on offer for three EPHS Year 10 students in 2017.
- Is this a "thing" that only "smart" kids can win? No. Not all Year 10 students will enter. If only three students enter, then they will get the scholarship.
- How much money can I win? The maximum amount is \$2500. The minimum is \$500.
