#### DEPUTY PRINCIPALS REPORT

The end of term is fast approaching and term 3 is only moments away. Term 3 is an important time, particularly for our senior students with the HSC courses of study completing and Year 11 completing the preliminary HSC courses. Year 10 will soon begin the process of selecting their subjects for the senior school and there are a lot of important activities planned in the coming weeks to support this process. For all our students this is an exciting time of year where we are acknowledging the hard work and dedication of our students through the recognition assemblies where students receive gold and silver awards, and of course reports are being issued.

#### Student recognition

In week 9 we have acknowledged the hard work and dedication of our senior students, where a great many were awarded with gold and silver awards. We celebrated the successes and achievement of 155 students at this assembly.

In week 10 we celebrated our junior students' successes and achievement and acknowledged 186 students with gold and silver awards.

Students are encouraged to continue collecting teacher awards towards bronze, silver and gold awards. If students have questions about the merit system or specific awards they should contact their year advisor for more information.

#### Examinations and assessment

Year 12 students will begin their Trial examinations at the beginning of next term. It is a good opportunity now to remind all students of the assessment and examination processes. Details of the assessment policies and misadventure processes are available on the school's website.

Students are reminded that if they are absent on the day of an assessment or examination that they will need to collect a doctor's certificate and complete a misadventure form on the day they return to school. If you have any questions, please see the teacher or Head Teacher in that faculty or contact the Deputy Principal in change of your year group.

Students are encouraged to ask for feedback in preparing their assessment tasks, and ask for help where they are experiencing difficulty in understanding or completing tasks. There are many support structures available in each faculty and through the teaching and learning centre to support students in this area.

#### Subject Selection processes

Over the next few weeks there are many activities planned to support year 10 students through the subject selection process. In week 10 of this term, students will meet with the Careers Advisor and Transition Advisor to look at options for study or transition into the work force.

In week 2 of next term students and parents will attend an information session about the subject selection process and requirements of the HSC. Students will be issued with a booklet with important information about each subject and the selection process. Representatives from each faculty area will be present on the evening to answer any questions about subject requirements and choices on the night.

On Friday of that week students will attend



information sessions in TAS and CAPA to get additional information about subjects in these faculty areas. This is a good opportunity to ask questions and clarify what is learned in these subjects. Other faculty areas will be speaking with students in class time over the next few weeks about subject options in those faculty areas.

It is important that students and parents are informed about the process and requirements and are encouraged to ask questions and seek advice throughout the process. If you have any specific questions, please contact the Careers Advisor or Deputy Principal.

### TAS 1 FACULTY

Year 10 Food Technology are coming to the end of their semester one unit of work - Food Product Development. They created their own food product and have been developing skills in preparing a variety of recipes including homemade pasta and sauces, stir fry, muesli slice and chocolate pudding. Year 9 are also finishing their semester one unit of work - Food in Australia. Next semester they will be studying Food for Special Needs.



Junior and senior support classes have been developing skills and confidence in preparing, cooking and serving a variety of recipes such as cheese and herb muffins, cookies, pizza, chocolate coconut balls, butter chicken, mars bar slice, chicken risotto and pasta salad.



Year 11 Hospitality have been completing mandatory workplace hours in the school café and they are preparing for an industry work placement. In class they have just finished the unit participate in safe work practices and have now started to work on prepare and serve non-alcoholic beverages, prepare and serve espresso coffee and prepare sandwiches.



Year 7 and 8 have been extremely productive working on their food and textiles projects in Technology Mandatory this term. Year 7 textiles constructed aprons with a personalised pocket design, Year 8 textiles designed, decorated and constructed bags. Year 7 food classes designed and produced an educational animation in relation to an environmental issue and Year 8 Food students researched and produced healthy recipes which were collated and made into a class recipe book.









### News from the School Farm

All agricultural students have now planted winter vegetables and the peas have taken off and are growing well. Tomato plants are still growing and producing fruit even though we are in the winter months – climate change?? Year 9 had the opportunity to recycle wooden pallets (that came with the air conditioners for the school) and change them into upright vertical gardens beds. They will be judged in Week 10 by both our Deputy Principal for best design and plants. Year 7, 11 and 12 students in Agricultural classes had a unique opportunity to watch and learn from the visiting smart farmers dairy classroom in Week 8. The dairy brought with them jersey cows and the students learnt about operation, management and biosecurity on dairy farms and they were able to milk a cow and learn about milk products. Thankyou to Wayne, our farm assistant for renovating and improving the duck pond area with a changed design for the pond and surrounding garden, rock beds and plants.

#### TAS 2 FACULTY Design and Technology

Senior Design and Technology helps students develop skills which will be valuable if they are considering future careers in numerous fields which use a design process. These future careers could include: Architecture, engineering, graphic, fashion or industrial design.

In the HSC year in this subject, students need to develop a Major Design Project or MDP which should aim to solve a problem which exists in society. The MDP counts for 60% of the external mark in the HSC and consist of a resolved solution to the problem, being either a product, system or environment. A portfolio is also produced which shows evidence of the processes used when working towards solving this problem.

The Year 12 students have been busily working on their Major Design Project which is due early next term for external marking. Some of the projects that students are working on include a gaming keyboard, modular construction housing, MMA gloves, interactive board game, an app to assist older people with computers, interior design and baby care devices.

This year in preliminary Design and Technology students have been working on a project to teach them the steps involved in, as well as the skills required to produce successfully MDP's. The project was called "Bright Idea's". Students were asked to design a desk lamp that reflected their personality. The project required them to use an existing USB light, which was provided, and be made from at least two different materials.

"I have always been into cars, muscle, Japanese, new and old, I love them all. It was obvious that my light was going to be something car related. By using Fusion 360 I made a full model of

my light where it was later 3D printed, ready for body prep and paint. The light had to include two different materials in the final product, so the 3D printed rim was placed on a wooden base." Alex Grima

"My desk light started out with a few sketches. These sketches were basic and gave the overall look. I then created more detailed sketches which showed dimensions, taking into account different ways it could be made and assembled and different changes that could be made to the base concept. I then made 3D model of the Light all its final dimensions on

Fusion 360, which allowed me to produce "working" or orthographic drawings. Based on this model, I then started work on the prototype." Brandon Shennan

#### Ms Neubronner's Elective History Class

Recently the year 9 Elective History class visited the Jewish Museum to assist their study of genocide. We travelled by train on a wet and rainy day and we were surprised by how slow the train was before navigating our way to the museum. We attended a seminar on the power of language and its relation to genocide. We were shocked to learn that the Germans had a choice to participate in the Holocaust, and very few choose not to harm Jews and other groups of people.

We then had the honour of meeting a Holocaust survivor – Anna. She was 8 at the time of the Holocaust. She was put on the cattle trains and barely avoided going to Auschwitz. She was made to work on a farm for 8 months, before being taken to the Bergen Belsen camp. The conditions were poor and barely liveable, because she was looking healthy she was put into a better part of the camp. She was given two slices of bread a day, one she would eat at breakfast and the other she would hide in her straw mattress to eat for dinner. She broke down in tears when asked about her young cousin who had been sent to Auschwitz.

During the tour of the museum, we learnt about how many of the Jews resisted the Germans by spreading hope. One famous artist took paint supplies in her



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suitcase, so she could teach the children how to create art in the ghetto.

After a delicious lunch we watched a presentation which compared the Holocaust to Rwanda.

#### **ABORIGINAL EDUCATION**

Erskine Park High Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students definitely deserve their two week mid-year break this year. They hit the ground running in February and haven't stopped. Here are a few of the things that they have been up to.

The Australian Indigenous Mentoring Experience (AIME) has once again kept us busy. We have a new Aboriginal mentor, Luke, who is fitting in nicely and doing a great job. So far we've had two AIME excursions for students from years 9 to 12 (don't worry Year 7 and 8 students— your turn next term!). Students underwent various mentoring sessions, learning about country, confidence and comradeship. Year 12 student Maddison Brown-Horrie graduated with honours at the final AIME Day of Term 2—well done Maddison! AIME Yarn Circle incursions have continued as well, every couple of weeks or so. Students have had fun strengthening their ties with their culture and with one-another.



This year we have started a few fresh, new program at Erskine Park High School for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. One of which is the Aboriginal Leadership Program (ALP). The ALP is a Links to Learning initiative run by a local organisation called Community Junction. It focusses on imparting

leadership skills to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. So far we have a good number of students who have been getting involved in these incursions. They take place once a week and are facilitated by local aboriginal leader, Jemma. Students do a multitude of activities that increase their leadership and teamwork skills whilst they learn about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture.



NRL Transitions is another program that is relatively new to EPHS. It began late last year and has continued successfully into 2018. NRL Transitions assists senior Aboriginal students in moving from school into careers, i.e. university, TAFE, trades and other occupations. Currently a small group of students are involved.

Sadly, we will say goodbye to our current NRL Transitions mentor, Andrew Fraser, who is moving onwards and upwards. Andrew has put in a lot of hard work with our students through NRL transitions and we wish him all the best for the future. Andrew is currently handing the ropes over to new mentor Geoffrey Waddell who is doing a great job. Our students are getting a lot out of this program.



Daren Dunn has continued his art workshops at EPHS again this year (Daren, a proud Gamilaroi

man from Coonabarabran, has hand-painted a cricket bat for Prince William, high heels for Princess Kate, a golf bag for Tiger Woods, and football boots for David Beckham, and was NAIDOC Artist of the Year in 2015). Students have created many fantastic works of art under his mentorship—many of which are now proudly on display at the entry of the school between the main learning block and the office. The precision, concentration, skill and diligence that goes into each artwork is remarkable. Students are currently working on a piece for NAIDOC (National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee) Week, coming up in July.

This year EPHS will take part in the local STEPing up Program. Students from local primary schools will visit us and participate in an all-day Aboriginal art workshop run by our art teachers. This will be an invaluable experience for 16 or so young Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal primary school students who will step-up and see what high school is all about while learning about Aboriginal culture.

#### **Issue 6**

The St. Clair and Erskine Park (STEPS) Junior Aboriginal Education Consultative Group (AECG) was formed this year. The STEPS Junior AECG is a student led group that meets once a term to make decisions about local Aboriginal matters in schools. Four of our students—Maddison Brown-Horrie (Year 12), Alexander Hundal (Year 11), Linae Williams (Year 10) and Jali Nipps (Year 8)—have joined. At the first meeting, students were given an introduction to what the committee is all about. Linae was unanimously elected Vice president—well done, Linae! The next meeting is in August. Students are looking forward to leading the way and having a say on behalf of Aboriginal students in the area.



On the 25th of May, a group of Aboriginal students journeyed into Sydney to take part in the Hyde Park ANZAC memorial service. A wreath was laid by Community Elders, Aunty Fay Carroll from the Ngunnawai Clan of the Wiradjuri Nation and Uncle David Williams from the Bundjalung Nation with assistance from Aboriginal

students from around Sydney. A group of Aboriginal students from EPHS, along with Mr Kelly, attended and paid their respects to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander service men and women who have represented and fought for Australia in the past. They laid down their own Aboriginal artwork amongst wreaths from other schools.

NAIDOC week falls in the holidays this year, so the NAIDOC week assembly will be held during week 2 of next term. This year's mantra is "because of her we can!" We will be celebrating women in Aboriginal culture and their powerful impact in our lives. A morning tea for the mothers, aunties, grandmothers etc. of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students will be held afterwards.

There we have it - a very brief wrap-up of some of the things our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students have been getting up to thus far in 2018. Get in some decent rest and relaxation, guys - you deserve it!

#### CAREERS

Year 12 students visited Sydney University in May for a tour and information session. We looked at course

options, university application and entry process, the ATAR, university costs, scholarships, student life, the transition from school to university, and alternative entry. This day was much appreciated by Year 12 as they gather information about further education options, and gain inspiration for higher achievement.

Year 10 and Year 12 students attended the Nepean Careers Market on 23 May. This was a great opportunity to talk to employers, Group Training Companies (apprenticeships), TAFE, Universities, UAC, private colleges, and government agencies about career plans, opportunities, and even subject choices for Year 10 going on to Year 11.

Some Year 10 students are going out on Work Experience during Term 2. If they bring completed Employers Assessments, Work Experience diary and attendance card back to me after completing Work Experience I will issue students with a Work Experience Certificate. This Certificate and the Employers Assessment are useful documents to include in a portfolio when looking for part time or full time work. The next period of work experience for Year 10 will be in Term 4 after final exams. It can be for one or two weeks, so may be done with one or two employers, so that students can have a variety of experiences.

Senior students may also do work experience at any time that fits with their schedule. They just have to see me to get the paperwork and information booklets.

Looking ahead, early in Term 3 the UAC (University Admission Centre) guides for 2019 will arrive in the school and I will issue these to Year 12 students and provide information on using the guides and applying for university. Shortly after that an adviser from Western Sydney University will come to the school to talk to students about their courses, bonus scheme, Scholarships and entry requirements.

Also, in the first half of Term 3 Year 10 students will be given lots of information on choosing subjects for the Senior years. I have started this process in Term 2 by looking at Vocational Education and Training (V.E.T.) courses during Careers classes, including some of the TAFE choices that are available in Year 11. During the last week of Term 2 Year 10 students have individual careers interviews to help them clarify their ideas.

In Term 3, Year 10 students will attend "Options Day", and there will be a Year 10 into Year 11 information night on 31 July.

Students and parents are invited to contact me with any queries about things such as Career choices



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and prospects, subject choices, VET courses, TAFE and University applications and information, School to Work, finding employment, or any other related issues.

## **ENGRAVING DETAILS**

## PLEASE FOLLOW THESE SIMPLE STEPS WHEN CREATING YOUR IMAGE.

- 1. ONE NAME PER PAVER.
- 2. Draw your image using a good quality medium thickness black marker pen (about 2mm thick). eg Artline 70 'High Performance' marker.
  - Do not use a ballpoint pen, coloured texta or pencils!
- 3. Make sure you rub out any pencil lines as these will show up on the finished paver.
- 4. Do not include computer-generated or pasted pictures. The hand drawn image engraving process is set up to engrave hand drawn images only.


