The work must be completed to a satisfactory level and submitted to their teacher by the date on their contract. Completing all work including assessments and class work is necessary to meet the requirements of both Preliminary (Year 11) and HSC course.

I encourage all students, especially Year 12, to visit the <u>HSC Study Guide</u> website. It provides valuable information in regards to exam tips, how to access your results and how to manage stress during exam time.

Every minute counts



Arriving to school on time is vital for your learning as every minute counts. Students who arrive on time and have excellent attendance will show results of successful learning. Blind chef's inspiring dream set to become a reality

Penrith resident Craig Shanahan is proving you can follow your dreams regardless of your circumstances, as the legally blind 27 year old sets out to open his own cafe and dessert bar. Diagnosed with cancer at the age of two, Mr Shanahan tragically lost vision in one eye. But this didn't interfere with his love for cooking as he completed his studies in Commercial Cookery at TAFE NSW and worked as a qualified chef for a number of years. Then, at 23, tragedy struck again when he suffered a life-threatening brain tumour and lost the vision in his other eye.



Refusing to let this get in the way of his goals, Mr

Shanahan, with his guide dog Rocko by his side, just completed his Advanced Diploma in Hospitality Management at TAFE Nepean, registered the name 'The Blind Chef Cafe and Dessert Bar' and is well on his way to securing a spot for his business in Penrith.

"I'd been living in Queensland for only six weeks when doctors discovered the life-threatening brain tumour. After spending four weeks in hospital and months recovering, I moved back to Sydney to be with family," he said.

"I still had the dream of opening up a cafe, so once I was able to, I decided to go back to TAFE to study. I know how to cook but I needed to learn the front of house and how to manage and run my own business."

Before commencing further study at TAFE Nepean, Craig completed a phone and a touch-typing course with Vision Australia, which allowed him to learn how to navigate a computer and smartphone through voice commands and touch. Returning to TAFE was daunting as he was uncertain about how he could navigate around the facilities but said his peers and staff made it an easy transition.

The Blind Chef Cafe & Dessert Bar is set to be an exciting addition to Penrith, offering fine dining restaurant style desserts in a relaxed setting. Mr Shanahan said he is working hard to make his dream business become a reality and pays credit to his time at TAFE for giving him the confidence to do so.

ENGLISH REPORT

"Books are a uniquely portable magic." - Stephen King

This term we are busy with new units of work, assessments, and reports. The debating season has begun and our Stage 5 teams have completed their first debates against Colyton High School with one win and one loss. Both debates were closely fought and the students did a great job with their arguments. There is an excursion to the Tree of Life Theatre Production at Casula Powerhouse Arts Centre organised for some Year 7 and 8 students who have been studying drama and a novel related to refugees in Australia. We hope this will be an exciting and inspiring experience for our students.



What are we studying Term 2?

Year 7: This term, students are undertaking their first novel study. All classes are reading their novels in class and completing a range of activities focussing on the development of characters and settings in novels. The upcoming assessment task will include students developing these in their own stories.

Year 8: The start of the term has seen students studying drama and reading and performing 'Hating Alison Ashley'. Students need to prepare for their upcoming assessment task by ensuring they know the basics of drama and how to write their own script using the writing conventions. Later this term, students will be looking at advertising and how it influences us.

Year 9: Students are well into their study of William Shakespeare's, 'Romeo and Juliet'. This unit focusses on the film adaptation by Baz Luhrmann and seeing how the play has been transformed for a modern audience.





Year 10: Conflict is the focus of study for the texts studied this term. Students are learning about the different types of conflict found in texts and the ways that various texts convey their ideas. The main text set for study is the film, 'Freedom Writers' and we aim to build further students' understanding of film techniques and how they shape meaning.

Year 11: Standard English is currently studying their Contemporary Possibilities module. Here they are looking at modern forms of telling stories through podcasts and websites. Advanced English is working on two texts this term, 'Macbeth' and 'Lion', with a consideration of the ways narratives shape our world as seen through different times and contexts. English Studies is currently studying Digital Worlds and multimodal texts.

Year 12: Students are working on their final modules of work. Advanced students are looking at the textual conversations between Shakespeare's, 'King Richard III', and Al Pacino's film, 'Looking for Richard'. The Standard English classes are reading a range of Henry Lawson short stories focussing on culture, identity, and language. The English Studies students are studying the 'We are Australian' unit which is centred on the film 'Australia' and how images of Australia are conveyed and what they tell us. Extension 1 students are continuing with their elective on 'Reimagined Worlds' and are undertaking a film study. The Extension 2 course continues with a focus on editing and refinement of the major work. All students have assessment tasks to complete by the end of the term. Students are encouraged to build a regular study routine as they progress towards the Trial Examination early next term.

Throughout the rest of the year, some selected male students from Year 7 to 10 will have the opportunity of attending Links to Learning Men's Shed here at school. Students attend the Links to Learning program one day a week as an alternative to attending school. While still developing reading, writing and numeracy skills students also gain a broad range of valuable skills in areas such as students attending the program will work on communication, teamwork, problem-solving, planning and organising, health, self-management and self-confidence as well as working on a practical project that the group will decide on in time.

Year 7 Camp

Last term saw Year 7 attend camp. The students all participated in a number of activities that required them to work as a team and face challenges together. The students enjoyed the experience and it is hoped that the friendships and skills developed will continue to carry through their schooling. A big thank you to the staff that attended and got involved in the activities.

Year 11 Camp

This term in week 2, students in Year 11 attended their camp at Nepean Adventure, Douglas Park. My School Matters program – Fusion

On Wednesday mornings this term, 16 students from Years 8,9 and 10 will participate in a 6 week course. It aims to provide leadership skills that equip, inspire and empower young people to make a positive difference in their school community. It uses interactive and team building activities, as well as leadership and social interaction skills training and encourages young people to consider what impact they can have in their school environment. At the end of the course, students will be given an opportunity to demonstrate their new skills.







STYMIE at Erskine Park High School

Stymie helps combat the bystander effect by enabling students to report incidents of bullying and harm, safely and anonymously.

- The bystander effect occurs when the presence of others discourages an individual from intervening in an emergency situation.
- Social influence affects how bystanders behave, and students are less likely to stand up to bullying behaviours in public when the number of onlookers is high.
- This bystander effect is also caused by a diffusion of responsibility - the belief that someone else will help.

Taking into account that our kids are very socially invested, many of them don't feel as though they can speak up and often, they just don't know how.

Rather than trying to work against this peer pressure, Stymie recognises the nuanced nature of their social currency, by providing security and anonymity to the bystanding community.

Frequently asked questions

- What is a scholarship? A payment awarded to a student that is to be used for learning and education.
- Who can get the 'Colin Shepherd scholarship'? Any 2019 Year 10 student who is going on to Years 11 and 12 or TAFE.
- What can I spend my scholarship money on? The scholarship money can only be spent on things that are education and school related. Past scholarship winners have used the scholarship for buying a laptop. Some students have used it for paying a PDHPE excursion to the ski fields. Other school expenses (fees, uniform, textbooks,

software) have been paid for with the scholarship fund.

- What do I have to do to apply for this scholarship? Attempt ONE of the tasks listed on the back of this page, submit it by the due date, and you are in the contest for winning the scholarship.
- Am I competing with students from around NSW? No. There are THREE 'Colin Shepherd' scholarships on offer for three EPHS Year 10 students in 2019.
- Is this a thing that only smart kids can win? No. Not all Year 10 students will enter. If only three students enter, then they will get the scholarship.
- How much value is in the scholarship? The maximum amount is \$2500, the minimum is \$500.

2019 Topics

- Discuss with your parents/family to identify a family link to an Australian Defence Serviceman or woman then research that person's life. Your research should cover his/her pre-service life, service training, overseas service, post-service life and issues (good and bad). Present your research and your views about his/her involvement, in a way that best illustrates his/her commitment to Australia's part in the war effort.
- Two Australians were awarded the Victoria Cross (VC) in 1919 in circumstances that could be regarded as unusual. Describe your understanding of circumstances under which a Victoria Cross might be awarded. Discuss the circumstances surrounding the two Australians participating in a post-Armistice conflict and of the actions that led to the award of their VC. Why might Australians today regard the award of a VC to these two Australians as unusual.
- The Battle of Binh Ba occurred 50 years ago in June. It was a most unusual battle and a significant Australian victory - discuss why this is so. What were the longer-term outcomes of the battle. Include your views about the Australian forces' capabilities displayed through that action.
- Conduct research into the broad range of animals

that have been used by Australian in any conflict since the Boer War. What uses were they put to? How effective were they? Detail at least two such instances. What are your feelings about the ethical use of animals in warfare?

- In recent years Australia has been involved in a number of conflicts including Iraq and Afghanistan. Choose one, then research to determine if Australia's involvement was valued by our Coalition forces. Was our military involvement accepted and supported by Australians generally? Why do you support (or NOT support) your research outcomes.
- Author a poem, design a visual display, or conduct research that best reflects your thoughts/feelings about the experiences of Australian P.O.W.'s. The work should focus on the WWII era. Present your research and your views about such experiences in a way that best illustrates the experiences of Australians.

LIBRARY REPORT 2019 Premier's Reading Challenge



The Challenge aims to encourage a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students, and to enable them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student to read, to read more and

to read more widely.

Students at Erskine Park High school are encouraged to maintain their reading for the Premier's Reading Challenge and to seek advice about logging the books that they have read. Cafe vouchers are given to students who have read 10 books and logged them on PRC site. Not all books are in the prescribed DOE list so it is always useful to check with library staff about this. So far, we have added 500 new books to our library since December last year. Six students have already completed the challenge.
